RE: PRESCRIPTION CHARGES

Thank you for your recent correspondence in respect of NHS prescription charges and the link to the State Pension age; your comments upon which I have read with interest.

As you may know, the Government has published a consultation on aligning the upper age for NHS prescription exemptions with the State Pension age. Currently, people receive free prescriptions when they turn 60 in England. This has not changed since 1974 for women, and 1995 for men. The State Pension age in England is currently 66 and is planned to increase further for men and women to 68 between 2037 and 2039.

The consultation seeks views on options for implementing a change in the age at which people in England become eligible for free prescriptions from the current age of 60, to 66 years of age. One option includes introducing a grace period meaning people aged 60 to 65 at the point of any change can continue to receive free prescriptions. The consultation does not propose any other changes to existing exemptions from charges, which remain in place for a range of ages and vulnerable groups, or those on low incomes.

Prescription charges make an important contribution to the NHS' budget. Between 2015/16 and 2019/20, prescription charges generated over £2.8 billion for the NHS, which has gone towards essential running costs for frontline services. It is estimated that the proposed change could bring in up to £300 million more for the NHS by 2026/27.

I have noted the comments you have made about this proposal and will ensure that Ministers are made aware of them. I would also recommend submitting your personal comments to the consultation, which runs until the 26th August, and can be found here:
